Attendees, besides myself and Coco (my Weimaraner), were Richard and Beverly Siri (Chair and Co-Chair), Eric and Lisa McGuire (Eric is Western Region Director), Warren Friedrich (Table Sales) and Jennifer Irwin (Lions Gate Hotel). We spent four hours walking the McClellan Convention Center, Lions Gate Hotel and meeting in a hotel conference room. This is an immense undertaking.

Speaking of the 2016 Sacramento National, we are nearing 50% sales of dealer tables so you better make your commitment sooner rather than later. We will sell out. The buzz is tremendous for this show. The hotel rooms are also limited on base. There are officer homes, executive suites, 1 and 2 bedroom suites and standard rooms available. Get your reservations early for there are only 122 available rooms, which include the homes and suites. In the event that we sell out at the Lions Gate Hotel,

we are contracted with two other hotels in the area in which you will be given the same rate with free shuttle to and from the convention center and hotel. All information can be found on our FOHBC web site.

There will be an American Bottle Auctions and Peachridge Glass sponsored open house reception at the historic Lions Gate Hotel Generals House on Thursday evening, August 4th from 5:30 to 7:30 pm. This event is for dealers who have bought tables, their assistants, displayers, seminar givers and those with early admission passes. There will be a cash bar and dinner barbeque for all the guests. This event occurs prior to the Sacramento Shootout, which will be held at the Lions Gate Hotel Club Ballroom. We also have a gentleman's agreement with Fred Holabird with Holabird's Americana Auctions to be our official Sacramento National auctioneer. Can't get much more appropriate and cooler that that!

Our entire event will be held at the privately owned McClellan Conference Center at the decommissioned McClellan Air Force Base. McClellan Air Force Base (1935–2001) is a former United States Air Force base located in the North Highlands area of Sacramento County, 7 miles northeast of Sacramento, California and 20 minutes from Sacramento International Airport. For the vast majority of its operational lifetime, McClellan was a logistics and maintenance facility for a wide variety of military aircraft, equipment and supplies, primarily under the cognizance of the Air Force Logistics Command (AFLC) and later the Air Force Material Command (AFMC). McClellan Airfield is also the home of the Aerospace Museum of California. The museum itself was originally set up as the McClellan Aviation Museum in 1986 (before the McClellan AFB closed). It was chartered by the National Museum of the United States Air Force and in 2005 it changed its name to the California Aerospace Museum.

Sacramento, as many of you know, is the place where our hobby began. After John and Edith Tibbitts organized the Antique Bottle Collectors Association of California, the event attracted so much interest nationwide that Charles Gardner (and Tom Hicks) became early members. That evolved in 1969 into the FOHBC. Before that, there were a number of individual collectors like Edwin LeFevre (who wrote an article on bottle collecting for the Saturday Evening Post of 10/19/1929), Gardner, Harry Hall White and some of those who are in our Hall of Fame and Honor Roll.

Also, please focus on the fact that the FOHBC 50th Anniversary is coming up in 2019. Bill Baab has a wonderful idea that is outlined in Member News of this issue. Check it out and let us know your thoughts. As a matter of fact, please send any of your comments, ideas and constructive criticism to myself, any of the board members or the BOTTLES and EXTRAS editor. We want to hear from you.

I also want to thank Rick and Cherry Simi for their wonderful hospitality and for their spearheading the annual Downieville Antique Bottle Show this past 11 and 12 September. This was probably my fifth annual visit. What a great little town that was founded in late 1849 during the California Gold Rush, in the Northern Mines area. It was first known as "The Forks" for its geographical location at the confluence of the Downie River and North Fork of the Yuba River.
