

DISCOVER MORE ABOUT CHATTANOOGA

- The **Chattanooga Bike Share** program allows you to ride any one of 300 bicycles between 30 stations in the city.
- With its fast internet, Chattanooga is known as the "Gig City," meaning you can download an entire digital movie (14 GB) in a little under 2 minutes.
- Garnet Carter invented miniature golf here in 1926 on Lookout Mountain and later went on to develop **Rock City**Gardens.
- At 1,120 feet underground and 145 ft tall. **Ruby Falls** is one of the deepest commercial caves in the world.
- The **Lookout Mountain Incline Railway** is the world's steepest passenger railway line at a 72.7% grade.
- There are over 3,200 acres of preserved Civil War battleground to explore in and around Chattanooga.
- 7 Chattanooga is the birthplace of the tow truck & the home of the International Towing and Recovery Museum.

- Chattanooga is home to the **Tennessee Aquarium**, the world's largest freshwater aquarium.
- Weighing in at 90 pounds, "Fat Cat," the largest blue catfish on exhibit in the world makes its home at the **Tennessee Aquarium**.
- The **Hunter Museum of American Art** in the Bluff View Art District holds the South's largest collection of American Art.
- Built in 1891. The **Walnut Street Bridge** is the second longest pedestrian bridge in the nation.
- The **Chattanooga Choo Choo's** lobby, a former railroad terminal, contains the largest freestanding brick dome in the world. The interior height of the dome is 85 feet.
- More than 300 kinds of trees & 900 varieties of wildflowers grow in the Chattanooga area, more than anywhere on earth, except central China.
- The world's first franchised **Coca-Cola bottling plant** was built in Chattanooga
 in 1899 by two local attorneys.

- The Lookout Mountain Flight Park and Training School graduates more pilots annually than any other school in the world.
- The highest overland bungee cord jump in the world is at **High Adventure**Sports.
- There is more rock to climb within a 25 mile radius of Chattanooga than Boulder, CO.
- A 1941 recording by Glenn Miller and his orchestra became internationally known for the 1941 gold record song "Chattanooga Choo Choo".
- The first **MoonPie** was made at the Chattanooga Bakery in the year 1917.
- Many famous people were born/lived in Chattanooga, such as famous blues singer Bessie Smith, R & B singer Usher, actor Samuel L. Jackson & NFL players Reggie White & Peyton Manning
- In 2014, Chattanooga hosted the IRONMAN race & received the highest athlete satisfaction index in IRONMAN history.
