The really cool thing about this is the GREAT people we have leading these efforts in each region. These folks are working tireless hours to pull it all together. Remember, these are not just bottle shows; they are major antique bottle and glass events with meetings, sales, displays, seminars, auction, banquet, breakfast and tours. They are events to be remembered.

In Chattanooga, experienced show organizers John Joiner and Jack Hewitt, who are Co-Chairs for the event, lead our "A" team. In Sacramento, the Show Chairs are Richard and Beverley Siri who are anchors in the west. We now have big-time veterans Jim Bender and Bob Strickhart as Co-Chairs in the Northeast who just announced, in a grand way, that Springfield, Massachusetts would be our convention location in 2017. If that is not enough, we have a new generation of major talent in Louis Fifer and Matt Lacy heading up the 2018 event. Wow, it really makes you proud to be part of such great operations.

If you see these people at a show or bottle meeting, please take the time to shake their hand and say thanks. Consider volunteering because we need your help. Just look at the show calendar and Federation show advertisements in this issue of BOTTLES and EXTRAS. We have planted our FOHBC flag within a date window for three years ahead. This takes a lot of hard work and coordination.

As you review this issue of BOTTLES and EXTRAS, make sure you focus on the FOHBC Membership Meeting breakfast on Saturday, August 1, at the Chattanooga National. This is the first time we are having a breakfast that is at no cost to our members. We have important votes to be taken and we want our membership in attendance. The FOHBC board is recommending that FOHBC membership rates be increased as follows: Regular standard membership: \$40, 1st Class membership: \$55, Canada membership: \$60, Other Countries: \$80, Clubs: \$75, Three-Year membership, 2nd class: \$110, Digital membership (new): \$25, (Associate membership will continue at \$5; Not available with Life or Digital Membership). We are also recommending the reinstitution of Life Membership. This type of membership has to appeal to everyone. Three possible levels of Life Membership were recommended for single members only: Level 1: \$1,000, includes all benefits of a regular membership. No promise of a printed magazine for life. Level 2: \$500, Includes all benefits of a regular membership, but you will not receive a printed magazine, but rather a digital subscription. Note: In the future, a Level 1 could become a Level 2. Level 3: Earned or Honoree. The Board would have the option of bestowing an honorary Life Membership. This person would continue to join the FOHBC at the regular membership rate. The Board will determine how this honor is earned. You can read the full notice in Member News of this issue.

You will also find an article on the great Jack Pelletier, "The Bininger Man" collection, by Jim Bender. This article idea was hatched at the 2015 Baltimore Antique Bottle Show and Jim was able to spend some time with Jack and his fabulous collection. Thank you both.

So enjoy your bottle collecting in the way you like best, but please make plans to come to our National shows. In the end, it is the people that make our hobby the greatest on earth.
