#12. • Three midwest ^{Swirls} - dated 1815 - 1840 \$1725.

- A. Middle - golden amber swirl \$800.
- B. Left - Same as middle but swirls reversed 8-3/4" Ht. \$575.
- C. Right - Deep golden amber \$350.

#13. • Pottery - Someone give me a bid - "Anna Bottery", black girl on jug - monkey face crawling up to "Shoo Fly" on jug while another fly makes its way under her dress, toward the "original package" - grey and blue glazes 6 inches high \$7425.

#14. • Eight Bennington type pieces of pottery \$5800.

#15. • Seven pieces of pottery and to prove to you that there are still some crazies still running loose with money \$9730.

#17. • Nailsea and Nailsea type bottles \$2945. then add on 10%. Ten pieces sold for, the lowest was \$130. and the highest was \$625. Most average \$180. thru \$240. 15% would go on top of these figures.

- #20. Seven Historicals sold for - \$77,495.
 The front one, Columbia and Eagle
 Portrait Flask - Cobalt - sold for
 \$35,200. Tax at 5% would be another
 \$1,760.
- #21. All of these are General Washington/
 Eagle Portrait Flasks. These were sold
 for \$15,015.
 The cobalt one on the right sold for \$ 7,150.
- #22. Nine Misc. Flasks - sold for \$26,207.
 The front right flask, General Washington/
 Eagle Portrait, deep golden yellow-
 Pittsburgh Area 1820-1840, sold for \$ 9,900.
- #23. Thirteen Misc. Flasks. The total sales
 amount on these were \$23,897.
 The green bottle in the front, middle,
 General Jackson, sold for \$ 7,150.
- #24. Lafayette - Masonic Portrait Flask, deep
 olive-green, pontil scar, Mt. Vernon
 Glass Works, Mt. Vernon, N.Y. 1820-1830
 sold for \$ 6,600.
- #25. Five Calabash in Colors. Sold for \$10,711.
 A. Louis Kossuth - Frigate
 Portrait 1845-1860 \$1,540.
 B. Jenny Lind - olive yellow, possible
 Ravenna- with 3 inch base crack
 1845-1860 \$ 440.
 C. Louis Kossuth - bright green \$176.
 D. Washington/Tree on reverse - cobalt
 blue \$745.
 E. Jenny Lind - Tree with Fruit on
 reverse - aqua \$7,810
- #26. Nine Misc. Cobalt Flasks. Would someone like
 to bid on these? I must ask that the bid start
 at \$30,000. These were bought for \$66,500.
 The third from the left only brought \$17,600.
 After all, it had some inside stain.
- #27. Eagle/Scrolled Medallion Historical Flask.
 Deep shaded red-amber. Pittsburgh Area -
 1820-1840 \$15,400.

- #28. You can buy these for \$21,450.
 A. Eagle-Scrolled Medallion - yellow olive \$ 6,600.
 B. Eagle-Large Sunburst - light blue-green \$ 2,200.
 C. Eagle/Rev. Eagle and Snake - brilliant yellow green \$12,650.
- #29. These five brought \$22,200.
- #30. These eight pieces sold for \$17,975.
 The back one, deep golden amber sold for \$14,000.
- #31. You are looking at \$18,650.
 Lowest price \$250. Highest price \$6,250.
- #32. These two beautiful pieces sold for \$2,000. and \$2,600.
 The yellow olive one had a 3 inch base crack and was in the auction book with a possible \$8,000./\$12,000. bid.
- #33. These six brought \$ 8,575.
- #34. Only \$7,115. for these seven. Approximately \$1,000. each.
- #35. These eight sold for only \$2,101.
 Approximately \$260. each. Getting down to my price range. The lowest was \$60. The highest was \$675.
- #36. So you think you can afford one after the last slide? You big spenders will have to come up with \$30,161. for these.
- #37. These ten sold for \$31,200. - Sales Tax would be \$1,560. Nothing for a bottle collector like Darrel Fitter.
- #38. Seven for \$25,950. The highest price was for the cobalt one in the middle - Masonic Eagle Historical Flask - Keene Glass Works - Keene, N.H. 1815-1830. \$14,000. plus tax.
- #39. Seven bitters and Misc. bottles.
- #40. These are Masonic Flasks in different colors. They sold for a total of \$5,200.

- #41. These ten are Railroad Flasks. You can see the embossing of trains on the flasks. \$ 9,325.
- #42. "Corn For The World" in seven different colors, and all for \$6,700.
- #43. Two "Corn For The World" and two Monument Flasks for only \$5,300.
- #44. Three more "Corn For The World". You can buy these for the give-away price of \$3,900.
- #45. Two Cabin Bottles.
- A. North Bend on the left - deep emerald green but with a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch base corner hole. Holes must be expensive for it sold for \$7,750.
 - B. The Tippecanoe Historical Cabin - deep olive-green. Now listen to this! It had a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch roof peck hole that had been repaired and also a 2 inch crack from the hole to the eaves (not repaired). With all this damage I thought I could buy it for \$25. I dropped out of the bidding at \$3,000., and it finally brought a price of \$16,500. and it only took 30 seconds to sell it.
- #46. Four more Cabins in Color. The one on the left and the one in the front you saw in the last slide. The total for these two were \$24,250. With the others tossed in it would now cost you \$37,725 plus \$3,886. inc. 5% sales tax.
- #47. These eleven flasks are called Sunbursts. The one on the left was \$11,000. or you may purchase all eleven for \$32,450.
- #48. Nine Sunbursts. Again you see the one on the left for \$11,000. You can have the other eight for \$18,775.
- #49. These eight flasks are called Scroll Flasks. They brought \$6,400., \$350., through \$1,400.
- #50. Three amber Scrolls, three cobalt Scrolls, and a bluish-green corset-waisted Scroll with a cost of \$2,750. The total cost of all seven was \$8,360.

- #51. Five more Scrolls for \$2,450.
- #52. J. R. & S. Scroll Flask- deep purple. J. Robinson and Sons, Pittsburgh, 1830-1834, sold for \$4,500 with a damaged lip. Came out of Mantua, Ohio, in 1966.
- #53. Now, if the past slide on the J.R.&S. Flask sold for \$4,500. give me an offer on this one. M.Carty and Torreyson, reverse Phil. Scroll Flask, light blue-green, made in Wellsburgh, VA 1845-1850.
The auction catalog had it listed as a possible \$700/\$1,000. bid. How wrong they were. Would you believe this little gem is better than diamonds! \$16,500.
- #54. You would have to bid over \$50,000. on these three.
On the left is the Jarred Spencer.
In the middle is the Medallion and Diamonds, yellow-olive.
Beads and pearls on the right.
Mr. Blaske had paid \$26,500 for the Jarred Spencer, the one on the left and it only sold for \$16,000. Total for the three bottles - a mere \$50,000., with the middle one at \$21,000.
- #55. These eight are called Summer/Winter. They brought \$12,375.
The cobalt on the right brought \$3,500.
- #56. Nine Summer/Winter Flasks.
\$2,900., \$3,000., \$3,500., \$900., \$800., \$13,500., \$31,000., \$32,500., \$1,000. Total \$31,950.
- #57. Pike's Peak Flasks in various colors, all for \$4,625. Range from \$250.-\$1,320. The aqua Pike's Peaks are very common going from \$40. through \$80. or so. They came out during the Gold Rush days. You can see the prospector with his belongings in a bag on a stick over his shoulder heading west. 1860-1880.
The back green on the left is Ravenna. Right rear amber is also attributed to Ravenna. Green \$475., amber \$250.
- #58. Union and Clasped Hands Flasks They only brought \$2,750.
Mostly midwestern 1860-1880.
- #59. Eleven Misc. Flasks of various colors. \$8,800. The range was \$350. through \$3,300.
- #60. On the left the Handled Horseman/Hound pictorial. \$2,200.
Middle - Flora Temple/reverse Horse. \$1,650.
Right side Sheaf of Wheat/ reverse Star, deep golden amber.
Would you believe it only sold for \$165.?
